If you have tears, prepare to shed them now....







HISTORY

Is it true that in the beginning Airstreams looked like the above?

Russ Comrie kindly loaned me the history of the Monterey Bay Unit, WBCCI, which I find most interesting. Charter members must forgive me if I pass along some bits and pieces which some of us haven't heard.

In November, 1971, a letter from Russ to Wayne Walker, President-Region 12, stated:

....since it is most difficult to impart or maintain enthusiasm for a unnamed organization we have taken "Monterey Bay Unit" as a name.

It is hoped that with the information now furnished you'll be abled to go ahead with the required action to secure for us a provisional charter.

Russ continued to correspond with the WBCCI, and later in November he wrote a letter to "Dear Fellow Airstreamers" in which he said:

There is no doubt in the minds of the officers of this club that it is off the ground and a going organization. We have an outstanding group of people that have joined to make it so and we are looking forward to working with you all. On November 27, 1971, Wayne Walker wrote to Russ:

I am forwarding the Provisional Charter for your new Unit by mail. My sincere congratulations upon the completion of this important step for the Monterey Bay California Unit toward becoming the newest addition to the big Wally Byam Caravan Club International family.

That was the beginning. Russ Comrie was the first President. I would like to reiterate his words to those charter members in 1971:

Dear Fellow Airstreamers:

There is no doubt in the minds of the officers of this club that it is off the ground and a going organization. We have an outstanding group of people that have joined to make it so and we are looking forward to working with you all.

We heartily agree.

INTRODUCING


We know each other, but we don't really know each other. Do we have common backgrounds, common interests, common goals? Have our paths crossed somewhere without our knowledge? Could we even be related somewhere back there? In the attempt to answer some of these questions, we will try to include one or more biographies in each Newsletter. In order to make this possible, please return your information form to Dannie as soon as possible.

It seems appropriate at this time to let you know a little more about your new president, BILL WESTON. I do know a little about this gentleman!

William B. Weston, Jr. was born in San Jose, the third child and only son of William Bunker Weston and Juliette Perrin Weston. He has two older sisters. Nancy and Juliette. He also had eight female cousins and one male cousin. What a fate! Bill's father was a pear grower in Santa Clara and the family lived on the Peraleda Ranch. Bill went to M.R. Trace Grammar School and Herbert Hoover Junior High in San lose. He says that he enjoyed Erector sets, trains, and steam engines when he was a little guy. He also drove a caterpiller tractor before he went to junior high....he had to stand on the track in order to pull on the starting rope!He started working on the Ranch in the summers while still very young, and loved to ride on the drag behind the tractor. (We have a picture of this.) He also rode horseback at this stage, but never became a great enthusiast.

Bill started high school at Bellarmine, but transferred to the Thacher School in Ojai, CA for the remainder of his high school years.

There he was introduced to hiking and camping, which became lifelong



hobbies. (He now considers Airstreaming to be a hobby. My idea of camping!)

After graduation from Thacher, Bill enrolled at Claremont Men's College in Claremont, CA. There he majored in Business Administration and economics. He met his bride to be in 1947 and went on a Grand Tour to

Europe in the summer of 1950. Bill graduated from CMC and was married to Dannie Beyette in June, 1951. What an achievement!

The draft reared its ugly head in September, 1951, and Bill was sent to Fort Ord for sixteen weeks of basic training. This was followed immediately by five months of OCS at Fort Riley, Kansas. His bride lived with Bill's parents at the Ranch (Wonderful, actually. We got to know each other.) Finally, in September, 1952, Bill was posted to Fort Lee, VA, and married life could begin. He remained at Fort Lee until March 1, 1954 in the Quartermaster Replacement Training Command. He says today that he spent two years, five months, and two days in the army. But a great thing happened at Fort Lee. On November 21, 1953, William (Will) Bunker Weston III was born....just yesterday, it seems, but we have just celebrated his fortieth birthday!

Bill was happy to get back to California and his job as Manager of the Peraleda Ranch. The summers were very busy as he sent great loads of pears out on trucks at the end of each day. Will was joined by his sisters Perrin and Bonnie in 1955 and 1958. It was a wonderful place to raise children and each worked on the Ranch in the summers as they grew older. But the Valley of Hearts Delight became Silicon Valley and fruit growing gradually came to an end. The vast orchards are gone. Bill presided over the sale of the Ranch and looked elsewhere for a place to live.

In 1979, Bill and Dannie moved to Soquel, Santa Cruz County. Bill finds himself very busy taking care of the new property, being an active Rotarian, and going on rallies.
